Be scam savvy

SCAM ALERI!

At this time of

year, many

people are Christmas shopping or hunting for January bargains but fraudsters are also keeping busy trying to steal your money.

Scammers take many forms, from posing as police officers asking for your bank details and cash, to rogue traders selling goods and services.

Some of the most common scams involve online shopping, social media messages and texts offering bargains, and parcel delivery texts.

Our top tips for keeping your money safe:

Be suspicious of 'too good to be true' offers and deals. Delay and seek advice first.

Never send money to someone you don't know or trust.

Buy securely – only make online payments if there is a padlock symbol in the browser.

Always log on to a website directly rather than clicking on email links.

Safeguard your details – never divulge passwords or PIN numbers.

Delete any suspicious emails and block telephone calls if necessary.

If you spot a scam, please report it.

Don't be embarrassed to report it if you have fallen victim to a scam; these criminals are cunning and can be easily believable. You may make it more difficult for them to defraud others.

# Burglars targeting your home for cars

In some areas of Devon and Cornwall we are seeing burglars targeting homes specifically for car keys before stealing the vehicle itself.

There are a few preventative measures you can take to reduce the risk of this happening to you:

Offenders often scout target addresses at night so report any suspicious vehicles or individuals.

Secure your home overnight; check doors are locked before bedtime.

Consider a motion sensor light or doorbell camera – these are visible deterrents.

Do not keep your vehicle keys in a quickly accessible or visible place. A common factor in these crimes is that car keys were within easy reach.

#### Shoplifters have no business here

Businesses have become more vulnerable to crime with the rise in the cost of living. Such crime can take many forms, from shoplifting and non-paying customers to burglary and theft from premises.

We are undertaking regular operations, extra patrols and crime prevention advice events to help you outsmart shoplifters and deter burglars.

A few simple ways to help safeguard your business: Greet customers – this can deter shoplifters as it shows that staff are paying attention.

Consider adding CCTV or repositioning stock/shelving in areas not seen from the till.

A security accredited anti-theft terminal (and tagging system) sends the message that 'this store is protected.'

Keep it tidy – clear visibility across a shop tells a thief that they are likely to be noticed.

Make sure you have a monitored alarm and 24-hour operational CCTV with facial recognition.

A well-maintained and well-lit exterior can reduce the likelihood of being targeted. Store wheelie bins away to reduce access to upper floors.

Lock and secure service doors when not in use.

Try not to keep cash on the premises overnight and always use a bolted down safe with a time lock and anti-tamper sensors.

We recommend joining business collectives who share intelligence and warnings about criminals, and work to create a safer environment for all.

Examples include a Business Improvement District, Pubwatch, or a shared radio network which is monitored by police, CCTV suites and other businesses.

#### **Keeping safe from spiking**

Spiking is illegally giving someone alcohol or drugs without them knowing. Contrary to popular belief, it is not limited to slipping a drug into someone's drink and includes:

Adding extra alcohol to someone's drink.

Injecting drugs into someone with a needle.

Giving someone drugs in a cigarette or vape.

Adding drugs to someone's food.

It can be hard to tell whether your drink has been spiked as it may not change the taste, smell or colour of your drink. If you notice any changes, stop drinking it and report it immediately to staff or security if you are in a bar or club.

Look out for symptoms such as confusion, nausea or vomiting, hallucinations and paranoia, disorientation, poor co-ordination or falling unconscious. If that happens, let a trusted friend or member of staff know immediately if you can.

We would encourage anyone who thinks they have been a victim to contact us. We are here to help you: we will listen without judgement and we will take you seriously.

You can use the dedicated form online, for whenever an incident has happened. Search for 'spiking' on the Devon & Cornwall Police website.

Remember to call 999 if you or someone else is injured or if you are in immediate danger.

# CYBER STALKED?

Cyber stalking is a form of abuse that happens through your electronic devices. Some of the signs are:



Receiving unwanted emails or text messages



Being harassed or threatened on social media



Having your computer and internet use tracked



Someone using GPS to see where you are

Cyberstalking happens when an electronic medium like a phone, email, social media site, or message board is used to harass, harm, or create fear in another. It can also involve tracking computer and internet use and using technology such as GPS to track where a person is.

Cyber Stalking is believed to occur within the majority of all stalking/harassment crime.

It is a dangerous and potentially life-altering crime; it should be taken seriously.

Sadly, there is a recognised increase in cyber stalking cases internationally, nationally and therefore also within Devon and Cornwall, especially since Covid-19 and the lockdowns.

The Force external facing cyber stalking campaign seeks to:

- 1. Raise awareness about what cyber stalking is and how it happens
- 2. Educate people about the signs of cyber stalking
- 3. Advise people about how to keep their devices secure
- 4. Provide signposting to help
- 5. Encourage reporting

cocaine - stolen items also recovered from the vehicle - driver arrested #NoExcuse #Fatal5



#Redruth - vehicle stopped after a report of impaired driving. Driver tested positive for cocaine and is now under arrest #NoExcuse #Fatal5 #OpLimit



#Camborne - Audi stopped and driver found to be uninsured. Vehicle seized and driver reported #NoExcuse #NoInsuranceNoCar





#StAustell - Fiat driving at excess speed and recklessly stopped. Driver found to be uninsured. Vehicle seized and driver reported #NoExcuse



#StAustell - Astra driver tried to avoid us but in doing so turned right into the path of another of our cars. Driver arrested after failing a roadside breath test for alcohol and vehicle seized on behalf of @DVLAgovuk



#StAustell - Citroen stopped as it showed uninsured - driver had an expired licence and tested positive for both



cannabis and cocaine. Drugs located in his possession as well. Vehicle seized and driver arrested #NoExcuse #Fatal5 #OpLimit

#Truro - disqualified and uninsured driver stopped and after testing positive for cannabis and cocaine he was arrested - vehicle seized #NoExcuse #Fatal5 #OpLimit
